

Question of the Month - What is Shale

Shale is a sedimentary rock formed from mud or clay. The clay or mud is compressed into a rock by the pressure of the water column or over-laying rock burden. When you look at a piece of shale, it appears to be composed of many layers and can often be split along these layers. This characteristic is referred to as fissility. Mudstone and siltstone are similar to shale, but do not have the property of fissility.

If you notice an area where there is a slight bulge in a piece of shale, and if you are lucky and split it along the correct parallel layer, fossils of small marine animals (trilobites, gastropods, and even ammonites) can be found. Animal tracks and impressions of foliage are also found in shale. Fossil bearing shale can be found right here in Dallas in the main creek that feeds Bachman Lake near Love Field Airport. If you are interested in looking, the best area is just south of Northwest Highway on Midway Road. There is no parking along Midway, so park in the Cochran Chapel parking lot or on Cochran Chapel Rd. Go to the east side of Midway, follow the path down to the creek, and look about 50 yards east of the bridge. The shale is exposed along the north side of the creek near the bend. A flat tool, such as a putty knife or a kitchen knife is ideal to split the shale.



Where else in the DFW area can you find shale? There is a large expanse of shale that runs from the western side of Dallas through Palo Pinto County to the west, from Denton and Wise counties to the north through Bosque, Hamilton, and San Saba counties to the south. There are surface exposures of the Barnett shale in San Saba County, but for the most part it covered by sediments and limestone. The Barnett shale has been in the news a lot lately as it may be the cap rock of one of the largest natural gas fields in the world. Pockets of oil and natural gas have been found under the shale for many years, but it has only been in the last 30 years that technology has allowed natural gas to be extracted from the shale layer. The process involves drilling down into the shale, and then long horizontal drilling tubes through the shale to find fractured areas where the gas leaves the shale and travels up the drill tube to the top of the well. In addition to the technique of horizontal drilling, drilling companies have also developed a technology of hydraulic fracturing of the shale. After the well is drilled, water is pumped down the well under such high pressures that it opens up fissures and fractures in the shale allowing the gas to escape into the well. In the last several years there has been development of wells at DFW airport and in residential areas of Ft. Worth. The picture to the left is of a drilling rig in Alvarado, Texas; but last time I was at DFW, I counted 9 nearly identical drilling rigs near the north entrance.



