May Emerald

May has only one birthstone, emerald. Emerald is the green variety of beryl (beryllium aluminum silicate – Be₃Al₂(SiO₃)₆, or is it? For most of modern history, the green coloring agent in emeralds was considered to be trace amounts of chromium. However, green beryl has been found where the coloring agent is trace amounts of iron or vanadium. Most green beryl that is colored by iron is a pale green with a tinge of yellow; it is generally heat treated to form aquamarine, the blue variety of beryl. That leaves us with chromium and vanadium as the coloring agents. Wikipedia has a statement that in the 1960s the United States changed its definition of emerald to include green beryl that is colored by chromium and, but green beryl colored by vanadium are not considered as emeralds in the UK and Europe. This is supported by Crystal Dictionary and Gem Select. This leads to a situation of "buyer beware" – an emerald purchased in the United States may not be recognized as an emerald, but rather as simply green beryl, in Europe.



Emerald is often heavily included with tiny stress fractures. These stress fractures are caused by the presence of the chromium atom replacing the aluminum atom as the chromium atom is much larger. The vanadium colored emeralds are generally much cleaner but the color may not be as deep. Most chromium colored emeralds come from Columbia while the vanadium colored emeralds generally come from Brazil. Emeralds are also found in a variety of locations including Asia,

Africa, Australia, Europe, South America, and North America. In the United States, emeralds have been found in North and South Carolina, Montana, Connecticut, and Nevada.

Most emeralds are faceted and many faceted in the classical eight sided "Emerald



cut". However, a unique and very rare variety of emerald called the trapiche is found in the Muzo Mine in Columbia. The trapiche has a six pointed pattern looking like spokes of a wheel. The spokes are dark colored with carbon impurities. When a trapiche is found, it is always cut as a cabochon. There is a trapiche emerald currently on display at the Perot Museum of Nature and Science in downtown Dallas.

Linda holds an AA and BS in Biology Education and is certified in both Texas and Oklahoma in the areas of composite Science, Chemistry, Physical Science and Spanish. From 1977 through 1999, Linda taught Earth Science, Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Botany, Anatomy and Physiology, Taxonomy, Entomology and Physical Science throughout schools in Texas and Oklahoma.


