A Thanksgiving Rock

There is no official rock for Thanksgiving —should there be one? If so, what should it be? What aspect of Thanksgiving should it represent? Maybe a turkey-shaped rock. How about a brown, gold, yellow, and orange rock to reflect the colors that leaves turn in the fall? How about a rock to signify the prayers of thanks? Even if you could find a rock that met any of these conditions, none of these would be a proper choice. It would just be ambiguous. So, what else might we examine? Historically, we associate Thanksgiving with a celebration started by the Pilgrims, one of the first groups to successfully colonize the United States of America. The pilgrims came to America on the English merchant ship Mayflower. Although they intended to land in Virginia, a storm blew them off course, and they landed in what is now Provincetown, Massachusetts. After scouting nearby locations, they relocated to Plymouth, Massachusetts, about 25 miles to the west. It is not known exactly where they landed in Plymouth Harbor in 1620, but it is possible they landed at Plymouth Rock. And now we have the answer to the question of what a Thanksgiving Rock would be. I nominate Plymouth Rock as our unofficial Thanksgiving Rock!

Plymouth Rock may or may not have been the place where the Mayflower landed in 1620. The first claim that it was the landing spot was made by a 94-year-old man, Thomas Faunce, in 1741, 121 years after the Mayflower landed. The estimated 20,000 lb. rock has also been moved several times. The first attempt to move it in 1774 resulted in the rock splitting into two sections (notice the crack running from the lower-left area of the photo to the middle of the top of the joined portions of the rock). Half of the rock was moved to the Town Square, the other half remaining at the original location. In 1834, the Town Square portion was relocated to the Pilgrim Hall Museum. In 1880, the Pilgrim Hall portion was moved back to its original



location and rejoined with the other half. In 1880, "1620" was engraved into the rock. In 1920, the entire piece was excavated and relocated to its current location on the shore. A granite pavilion was built to cover the rock. During each movement of the rock, portions of the rock were broken off (some accidentally and some intentionally), leaving only about one-third of the original Plymouth Rock. (Continued on Page 2)

Plymouth Rock is a thick slab of Dedham granite. Dedham granite is not native to Plymouth, Massachusetts. It is found near Dedham, Massachusetts. Dedham granite is approximately 600 million years old and was transported to Plymouth by glaciers about 20,000 years ago. Dedham granite ranges in color from pinkish-grey to greenish-grey. Like most granites, it has a Mohs hardness of 6. As a granite, it would be easier to work than quartz and would take a nice polish. Dedham granite has been used in construction as exterior materials, including slabs for buildings and brick-shaped pieces for home exteriors. Today, Dedham granite is popular in the Massachusetts area for kitchen countertops and tabletops.

The final event of the convention was the Awards Banquet. The dinner was held at Nature's Gallery, a fine-mineral retailer in Austin. The Gallery was open for an hour before the dinner to allow shopping with a 10% discount. Many of the pieces were museum-quality mineral specimens. What a lot of eye-candy for a rockhound.

I thank the Austin Gem and Mineral Society for planning and executing the SCFMS convention. The facilities at their clubhouse were perfect for the Editor and Webmaster Breakfast and the Annual Meeting. Their connections with Natures Gallery made the Awards Banquet the best SCFMS or AFMS Awards Banquet that I have had the opportunity to attend. My only wish was that more SCFMS Clubs could have participated in all the activities.

Perhaps to clarify, this second is not a second as a fraction of a minute, but a second person or a back-up person. The question being addressed here is whether or not one has a back-up plan, a second person to assist where needed.

We have a hobby filled with creativity, exploring collecting sites, building better gem and mineral shows, teaching others, encouraging new members, and many, many other activities. We also tend to push our limits, try new things, do our best, and reach farther than we did yesterday. If we feel we have planned sufficiently well, we are willing to take a few more risks, and this is the place to seriously consider having seconds with us or nearby.

It has long been known to go rock collecting with a second person as a just-in-case back-up person. To have a second person help us with a heavy lift. To have a second person hold the ladder as we install the club banner at a show. As we push our limits, it would be wise to also consider the wisdom of having a second person with us, or nearby, as a measure to ensure a successful outcome.

When we break or lose our glasses, it is wise to have a second person who can read the information on the bottles of our medications. A second person is helpful when we grab our chest during the too-steep hike up the

hill to the mine. A second person is helpful to look in on us when we have tripped and fallen in the lapidary shop. A second person is helpful to navigate as we drive to a confusing destination. There are countless instances where having the aid of a second person can be a life-saving, time-saving, effort-saving or a reputation-saving presence.



As we push ourselves to do more, be more, reach more, take more risks, having that second person is even more important.

Think of that person with a sudden and violent allergy reaction - having that second person can be vital in saving seconds (the time ones) to dig through the car, truck, backpack or medical kits to locate that all-important rescue medication. 
