
The meeting was adjourned about 9:20 pm.

Mason County Topaz The Texas State Gem

Topaz, the state gem of Texas, is found within the borders of the state only in Mason County. It occurs in granite outcroppings principally in the Streeter, Grit, and Katemcy areas. It is usually found in streambeds and ravines but occasionally can be located atop the ground.

Topaz resembles quartz and ranges in color from clear to brown to yellow to sky blue. The blue stones are especially beautiful when faceted in the Lone Star cut.

Items you will need with which to hunt topaz area pick and shovel and a wire screen with about ¼ inch mesh. Small pieces of topaz can sometimes be found by sifting dirt through the screen. A nice-to-have but optional item is a chemical called bromoform. Topaz will sink in this chemical, whereas the less dense quartz it so resembles will float. WARNING: bromoform is highly toxic and should be handled with care, and kept away from children.

You can enjoy topaz hunting throughout the year except during the months of November, December and early January, when the ranches are closed for the deer season. Since digging is often required to find stones, topaz hunting is more pleasant when done during the cooler months. The week following a rain is an excellent time to hunt topaz, since the ground is softer and easier to dig.

Currently, only three Mason County ranches offer the public the opportunity to go topaz hunting. They chare by the day; you keep what you find. Some very nice stones have been found in this way. In fact, since there is no commercial mining of Mason County topaz, hunting it yourself is one of the main ways of finding it. You may hunt topaz at either of the following ranches.

Garner Seaquist Ranch charges \$15 per person per day. Children, ages 7-12 are \$5 per day, and children under 7 are free. Contact Mike Seaquist for first hunt at (325) 347-5413.

Lindsay Ranch: Tak US87 north from the Mason Courthouse 4 miles north of town. You'll see the sign for Lindsay ranch Road on your left, as well as a sign for their Comanche Creek lodging facility. Follow the signs on up to the house. Call first to make sure someone will be available. (325) 347-452.

TXI Field Trip – September 13th

Well, we had a great field trip Saturday, September 13th, 2008. Our destination was the TXI Cement Plant Quarry in Midlothian, TX.

Our trip almost didn't happen because of Hurricane Ide. After several days of watching the weather and staying in contact with TXI we decided to throw caution to the 110 mile an hour winds in Galveston, TX and head south for a fun time to collect pyrite, calcite, septarian nodules, and marine fossils including sharks teeth, ammonites, baculites (straight ammonites), and shells molds.

Leaving that morning at 7:45 for our 8:45 meeting time the clouds were low, thick and dark. Several minutes later a light sprinkle started. I stated, "This doesn't look good" not to anyone in general, but just concerned about the trip. My five year old son Daniel asked "Why" as if a certain soaking was not even a trivial matter to consider. This is the case with Daniel even if he has been given a thimble full of water. This does not come close to explain his delight that when there is water it can make mud! With a small amount of reluctance I told him that our trip could possibly be cancelled because of the rain. He said "OK" as if only along for the ride. The rain soon subsided, only to return with more vigor 20 minutes later. Again, I said, "This doesn't look good" to no one in particular and again getting the "Why" response. I am sure that this conversation happened at least one more time before our arrival.

Our limited attendants list for this trip was full almost immediately after the email went out. With 25 people signed up for the trip 22 attended. Several cancelled at the last minute and I invited the ones on our waiting list. We had a great turn out!

The weather for our collecting was over cast, slightly windy, with a temperature of about 77°F. Great collecting weather! With only one five minute shower the day was perfect. The rains actually helped our collecting by making the fossils more visible.

BEEF AND BARLEY SOUP

3/4	Pound Ground Round	1	Small Can Veg-All
1/3	Cup Pearl Barley	1	Can Beef Broth
1	Small Chopped Onion	1 ½	Cup Water
1	Clove Minced Garlic	1	Bay Leaf
1	Diced Carrot	1Tbbs	Parsley
1	Rib Minced Celery		Salt & Pepper to Taste
1	Small Can Whole Corn		

Brown Ground Beef, Onion and Garlic in Dutch oven or heavy kettle until it is no longer pink. Add all other ingredients except Veg-All and Corn. Cover and simmer for 1 1/2 hours. Add the Veg-All and Corn and cook another 20 to 25 minutes. Best if beef is very lean, otherwise the soup will tend to be a bit greasy.





5-MINUTE CHOCOLATE MUG CAKE

4 Tbbs	Cake Flour (that's plain flour, not self-rising)	4 Tbbs	Sugar
2 Tbbs	Baking Cocoa	1	Egg
3 Tbbs	Milk	3 Tbbs	Oil
3 Tbbs	Chocolate Chips (optional)		A Small Splash of Vanilla Essence
1	Coffee Mug		

Add dry ingredients to mug, and mix well. Add the egg and mix thoroughly. Pour in the milk and oil and mix well. Add the chocolate chips (if using) and vanilla essence, and mix again.

Put your mug in the microwave and cook for 3 minutes at 1000 watts. The cake will rise over the top of the mug, but don't be alarmed! Allow to cool a little, and tip out onto a plate if desired. EAT! (This can serve 2 if you want to feel slightly more virtuous).

Why is this the most dangerous cake recipe in the world? Because, now we are all only 5 minutes away from chocolate cake at any time of the day or night!



Meeting Map




